- Co-Chair Bill Blanchard called the meeting to order

- Long-standing rep to KAN from the Council
- Many good works in the community
- Motion for KAN to be in favor of Dave Asher
  - o Seconded, approved, and unanimous approval

o "Thank-you" card circulated

# 7:15pm RapidRide Transit K-Line

- Metro staff presenting: Vic Stover, Brian Henry
- Description of RapidRide (Vic)
  - O Stations are distinct, higher level of amenities
  - Vehicles have the latest features, often first in fleet for new features
  - Speed and reliability: optimized routes and timing, investments in infrastructure (e.g., queue jump lanes) and high frequency
  - o Service and operating plan
  - Branding
- Capital investments
  - o Passenger facilities
  - Accessibility
  - o Safety, comfort, and security
  - Access to transit
  - Speed and reliability
  - Communications and technology
- Question (Lisa): how much capital investment is expected of the City of Kirkland to support the K-Line?
  - o Support can come in many forms: financial, road upgrades, etc.
  - o Haven't determined yet how much the city will support
  - Looking for opportunities to cooperate on projects that may already be in the pipeline
- Benefits of the K-Line
  - o Connects fast-growing communities between Eastgate and Totem Lake
  - o Supports the Kirkland Transit Implementation Plan
  - o Incorporates feedback from the North Eastside Mobility Project
  - o Connects riders to other high capacity transit option in the area
- Started preliminary design phase in September 2019
- Integrated transit network
  - Supports higher demand for transit
  - o Connects riders to high capacity transit options
    - RapidRide B Line (existing)
    - ST Link light rail Blue Line (2023)
    - I-405 Bus Rapid Transit (2024)
  - Complementary service restructures
    - Coordinating with Sound Transit, partners, stakeholders, and riders
- Prompts for feedback in this meeting
  - What connections are most important to you?
  - When the ST Link Blue Line opens in 2023, how would you prefer to get to downtown Seattle?
  - What priorities are most and least important you when you think about possible changes to bus service on the Eastside? In Kirkland?
- Ouestions
  - o (Bill) How did bus service in Seattle change when the light rail went in?

- Not getting stuck in traffic is a game changer: reliability
- A lot of people are more than willing to transfer to light rail, because they know they'll zoom along without hitting traffic
- o (Bill) Will RapidRide B go away when the light rail goes through Redmond?
  - No, they are complementary, serving different neighborhoods on their routes
  - And the RapidRide has more frequent stops, differing from light rail
- (Leo) Unless the buses are in bus-only lanes, they will be slowed by local traffic. I give strong support to bus-only lanes, to preserve their value to transit users.
  - That's our experience in downtown Seattle, for sure
  - Will be looking for opportunities for this
- o (Karen) What's the difference between RapidRide and Bus Rapid Transit?
  - BRT is Sound Transit, not Metro; runs primarily on freeways
  - Much longer routes with stops far apart
- K-Line <u>route options</u>
  - Analysis points
    - Travel times, potential time savings
    - Equity and social justice
    - Destinations and activity centers served
    - Network considerations
    - Projected future ridership
    - Community engagement
  - o Public survey, events, briefings in November
  - o Northern segments (see map on webpage)
    - From Kirkland Transit Center, current Metro 255 route (A1) to Totem Lake, vs. going up 85<sup>th</sup> to North Rose Hill, and then north on 124<sup>th</sup> Ave. to Totem Lake (A2)
    - (Lisa) Important to note that choosing A1 will directly impact the Metro 255, possibly eliminate it, possible move it
    - (Ken) The important point is to get people to their destinations (UW, and especially downtown Seattle) in shortest time. The current change to 255 is already making a hit to getting downtown
    - (Debate ensued on whether travel to downtown is faster or slower with the 255 change; opinions differ)
  - Southern segments
    - From South Kirkland Park and Ride: along Lake Washington Blvd to Kirkland Transit Center (B1), vs. following the Metro 255 route on 108<sup>th</sup> Ave. (B2)
  - Comparisons
    - What counts as a "Destination and activity center?"
    - Shopping, services, resources, places of community interest
  - o How many stops will be on these segments?
    - Not yet determined, but roughly quarter-mile

- How many additional buses would be on these routes, than currently are on these same roads?
  - Standard is 10 -minute service
- Timeline
  - o Prelim design now through end of 2020
    - Needs and priority assessment
    - Draft concepts
    - Final concepts
  - o Opening in March 2025
- Community engagement
  - o Introducing the K-Line
  - Online <u>survey</u> is open through end of November
  - Ensure stakeholders understand how K-Line will benefit their communities
  - o Build relationships and include communities in decision making
  - Lead with equity
  - o Meet the community where they're at, including
    - Stakeholder engagement and briefings
    - Community surveys
    - Tabling events
- Actions
  - o Take the online survey by 11/26/19 (~25 minutes)
  - Subscribe to project updates
- (Lisa) Would like to see cost data on each of the route options
  - For example: how much service improvement would a queue jump investment buy us?
- (Heather) Any effect from the recent Sound Transit funding budget hit?
  - o Hard to say yet. Some parts of the project are not tied to car tabs.
- (Ken) The RapidRide kiosk signs that show bus arrivals are not reliable. Please divert funding to improve the data capture.

- Been out presenting to many neighborhoods
- Timeline
  - o Project suggestions due 12/3/19
  - o 4 neighborhoods have not yet selected a rep
- We're at 60% design on last year's projects

# 7:57pm Street light program update

- Kathy Robertson presenting
- 46 upgrades completed
- Approx. \$86K committed to date
- Remaining sites to be installed:
  - o Two PSE sites (sched for December)

- Two City of Kirkland lights on hold pending LED fixture evaluation/selection; need to be able to shield
- Balance remaining: \$112K
- Next tasks:
  - o Complete four sites on original list
  - Next list of sites
    - Finish evaluating next 38 potentials
    - Continue until we expend the remaining budget
  - o Report back in March 2020

## 8:03pm Sign compliance volunteer program

- Karen Story and Patrick Tefft presenting
- Types of illegal temporary signs
  - o A-Frame
  - o Flags
  - o Balloons
  - o Off-site
  - o In the median
  - Wind-activated devices ("string people")
  - o Offsite "for sale"
  - o Exceeds 6 sq. ft. / located in sight distance triangle
  - o Real estate arrows
- New volunteer role: Temporary Sign Compliance Assistant
  - o Piloted the role for six months
  - o Team assignment, coupled with a paid code enforcement officer (CEO)
  - o Compliance Assistant is <u>not</u> doing enforcement
  - o Four volunteers in the pilot
    - Paired with the two enforcement officers
    - Patrolling on weekends
    - Inform businesses
    - Remove signs, take possession
    - Maximum one shift per month, 3-4 hours
  - o Pitching this idea today
  - o Anyone interested: contact Patrick, 425-587-3012
  - Ask around your neighborhood for interest in volunteering
  - o Ideal goal: one volunteer based in each neighborhood
- Handout: volunteer position description and application
- Karen's experience as a volunteer
  - It's a great opportunity to learn about code enforcements of all kinds, as
    CEOs do all city code enforcement
  - o No one has ever reacted poorly; zero conflict
  - o Have pulled easily 600 signs in the last year
  - o Going out this Saturday, planning to pull political signs (were supposed to be removed 7 days after election)
  - While it's a "once-a-month" commitment, we don't actually go out that often; the CEOs are often too busy

- When signs are impounded
  - We keep them for a month
  - If owners retrieve their sign, they have to sign a promise to not violate again

## 8:17pm Missing middle housing

- Feedback and question opportunity, after October discussion
- Handout: summary page of ADU change proposals, from last month
- What has come up in your neighborhood?
  - Zero lot lines for detached ADUs
  - o Parking
    - No or low parking requirement; may force more on-street parking
    - No parking required even for 2 ADUs, within ½ mile of transit service with 15-minute headway during commute hours
    - Definitely a hot topic for KAN and for residents
  - Absentee landlord rentals (owner occupancy requirement)
  - o AirBnB (and other short-term services) rental of units
    - (Karen) City already has restrictions on this
- Conversation in the room generally trended toward the Houghton Community Council recommendations (e.g., owner occupancy required, parking required for a second ADU, etc.)
- Zoning
  - Feedback from some residents: Concentrate multi-family housing in the higher-density zones
  - o (Heather) Aging in place is a strong argument for ADUs
- (Lisa) Increasing duplex and triplex as affordable options
  - o Seems to be more support for these, rather than ADUs, rentals
  - o Make them like condos, where you can own one unit of a duplex/triplex
  - That's not how they always work; many are owned by one party who rents out the other unit(s)
- (Bill) New ideas, cropping up around the country
  - o Eliminate single-family home permits; require multi-family builds
  - o Use AI to determine who is going where
  - Speed up the permitting process
- (Janet) Likes the idea of spreading density across neighborhoods; give people more diverse choices of where to live, in what conditions
- (Bea) Are we really going to get what we're trying to promote, or are we just going to get small and still very expensive units?
  - o Example: a "cottage" in North Rose Hill is listed for \$1M
  - o (Bill) Affordability is out the window; we've built a lovely place to live and now lots of people want to live here
- Limiting the number of people who live in a house
  - o Fair Housing rules forbid any limitations
  - o City should not try to regulate it
- Access to transit
  - o (Bea) Tying housing rules to transit infrastructure is problematic

- Transit networks change!
- (Bea) I've never seen proof of the statement that forcing more on-street parking acts to slow down traffic
- (Leo) Part of the problem is people buying more than one house, as investment property
  - Drives up prices overall
- Continue to bring this up in your neighborhoods, bring comments back to KAN
