- Q&A
 - o (Ken) Which of the focus areas do you believe resonates most and least with residents?
 - Climate has a lot of enthusiasm
 - Sustainable business has less emphasis right now, as businesses are in survival mode
 - (Ken) Should equity/inclusion be its own plan, rather than part of this sustainability plan?
 - David was considering equity/inclusion at the outset of the project, and then it swelled into higher emphasis with BLM movement
 - City Council gave great direction and encouragement
 - Result: equity is woven throughout, not just in its own section

7:45pm Budget overview

- David Wolbrecht, presenting
- Walkthrough of the budget proposal for the next biennium
- Highlight on Community Safety Initiative
 - Harvesting best practices from other communities
 - o Non-police response personnel, policies
 - Enacting Resolution 5434: safety, welcoming, inclusion, equity
- Q&A
 - o (Anna) Where is the impact on budget from development fees, etc.?
 - There are many funding sources addressed in the budget. The overall projection is for deficit over the next biennium.

- o (Debbie) Like the Community Partners aspect
- o (Janet) Will it be difficult to recruit the non-police responders that we wnt to get?
 - Hopefully we'll be leading the pack, by being ahead of other communities! We'll find out.
- (Ken) Looked back at past budgets for forecasts of property tax vs. sales tax. Property tax outweighed sales tax as an income source.
 - Yes, I believe that's true.
 - (Chris) Prefer this, as sales tax is regressive. Would like to see the majority of tax income from property or income tax.
- o (Mark) Do you have a bottom-line figure for the budget?
 - Don't have the numbers at my fingertips, will get back to you
- o (Laura) Is there a foundation of austerity for this budget cycle?
 - Absolutely. Watch a council meeting to see how it's being expressed: "No new actions without demonstrated funding," etc.

8:05pm Neighborhood Services Program

- David Wolbrecht, presenting
- Maintaining current staffing levels
- Same amount for Matching Grant Programs as 2019-20
 - Was previously done on a flat rate + per capita amount
 - o Difference cycle-over-cycle is probably in the \$100 range
 - o Alternative? Would have to create one ... Even split across all NAs, etc.
- Discussion on allotment methods
 - o Karen: If we looked at the total available, maybe we could discuss over email and determine if there's a better way
 - o \$2,500-\$6K per neighborhood, intended for community events, communication, etc. (\$44K total)
 - o Grant dollars are matched to funds spent or to volunteer hours
 - Decision: KAN to consider alternatives by email, then Bill will convey a decision to David by 12/1/20

8:20pm Neighborhood Safety Program

- David Wolbrecht, presenting
- Continuing, with exact funding TBD
 - o May be a supplementing grant underway from federal funding
- Watch for email with milestones, requirements
 - o Submitting project ideas is the first step
 - o Submit on the "Suggest a Project" site
 - Deadline pushed back by two weeks

8:25pm Shop Local Kirkland update

- Martha Chaudhry, Special Projects Coordinator in the City Manager's office
- Biggest challenge right now is moving the business applicants through the process
- Social media promotion is well underway, plus a mailer to 39K households
- 140 businesses on the platform, 200 in the pipeline

- 18K hits on the site to date, exceeding expectations
 - At least 1K click-throughs to businesses
- (Bill) What are your criteria for success?
 - o Originally: register 25 businesses by end of October; <u>number</u> of registrants
 - Now, with pace good, considering other measures of success (for example, 10K eyeballs by end of year)
- Window decals, other promotional materials rolling out
- Advice from KAN for robust consumer engagement?
 - (Chris) Highlight a consumer <u>story</u>, showing success and fulfillment, especially as part of a holiday promotion.
 - (Martha) Great notion, though the City can't promote any particular business
 - (Anna) Avoid that issue by having the businesses themselves post such content on their own behalf.
 - (Bill) Is there a brochure or packet that I can convey to a local business? (Answer: yes, let Martha know and she can provide it.)
 - (Laura) What's been done well in other places, trying the same thing?
 (Answer: We've certainly looked as similar models: Auburn, King
 County, etc. Our version is more visual than most. Our current efforts are concentrated on outreach, social media, and financial incentives more than simple altruism.)
 - Watch for "pledge" campaign to roll out
 - Pledge to buy local
 - Craft good user stories around this
 - (Laura) Can you get a big corporate retail to sponsor in some way?
 (Answer: open to partnerships, concentrating now on platform.)
