






- But people park half on the sidewalk, so people cannot get by on the sidewalk






- Parking the 2 extra cars in driveway blocks the car in the garage, and often the garage car needs to leave first; by parking one car in street, everyone can get out without moving cars.






- It seems that Kirkland Heights does not have enough parking spaces to accommodate their residents, and now they are parking on 136th Ave NE creating a traffic hazard




- Children grow up and get a car


#### Q14 Comments






- LWSD events

#### **Q20 Comments**



- As we have increasing health issues, using public transit or walking long distances from the vehicle becomes much, much more difficult except on "good" days. Public transit isn't really convenient from our house, but even worse I've had more than one driver hit me with a magazine or yell at me for not giving up a "handicapped" seat. I do not have a visible handicap, and it'd be easier if I did because then I'd likely get less harassment. Busses are not friendly any more.
- avoid the area. don't want to deal with no parking.
- I don't usually try to attend anything in downtown Kirkland. Historically it was both a pain to park and then a pain to deal with traffic after the event.
- I never go to downtown when there is an event. Too much of a hassle to park when there is no event. I leave for doctor appointments a half hour sooner to do parking search.
- I rarely attend downtown events anyway, except 4th of July and Winterfrst
- Park place usually has parking
- We rarely go into downtown Kirkland, except to Park Place to eat or shop at QFC; but when we do, we use the other options noted.
- Wednesday market parking can be difficult, if later than 3. I used to park on Park Lane but they took out most of the parking spots.




- Aggressive driving to try to get an open spot
