







Q5: Does your street have sidewalks on one or both sides of the street?






Q7 Comments

- I wish there were sidewalks on our street so we could feel safer having our kids out riding their bikes/scooters on them. Our street is not family friendly, in my opinion. I also wish we had a crosswalk going across 116th, as that is a very busy street.
- If one parks on the street, then those cars have mirrors and other parts broken off as people drive fast sometimes.
- I'm not aware of 'no parking' signs on the non-sidewalk side, but people rarely park there because the street is narrow.
- it is really tight on the 90 degree curve from 114th to 103rd pl. hate it when people park on this corner-it is tight and cant see oncoming cars
- Ne 104th St is fine but 111th is not. No sidewalks and too narrow for parking on both sides of the street on 111th. People are speeding and there are blind spots. It is becoming increasingly dangerous due to development related additional traffic.
- One car parks near where there are trees in the middle of the road. They reduce the width in that area.
- Parking in my neighborhood imperils the two way traffic.
- Parking isn't consistent across both sides of the street. Would be great to have more parking as the Woodland Park (Castle Park) takes up most of the spaces during the day.
- People drive extremely fast down and up the hill in front of our house on NE 94th St, and rarely stay in the proper lane space. There is a lot of "middle of the road" driving.






- Neighbors park all over the street






Q11: Of the available parking spaces, how full is your street on a typical...




Q12 Comments




Q14 Comments






- 13th West Ave is an prime example where the construction of sidewalks has narrowed the roadway to the point of being dangerous for two way traffic




- Expressed concern to the city about problems on 111th in general but no resolution resulted.

- How did we have a dog walker and a neighbor of ours killed walking near 144 and 119th near Sept 2014? We have had many cars going to fast just as we walk to a local store like our Kingsgate Safeway or Pizza Bank, so that one feels shocked at why do they drive fast in our residential neighborhood of High Woodlands? There are cars and motorcycles, that drive by loudly or late at night, that I could say wake up my husband or I, but by time we go to windows on the front, that car is gone. I did not move here to see or feel cars driving near me. We have called our President of High Woodlands homeowners group Jim Eagan most of the time. We do not feel, that the flags help, but the stripping might. Othertimes, why not have more police just wait and hand out tickets to slow cars down.
- Parking. Said they would look into installing a sign at a place often used but inappropriate size for parking, which blocks driveways. Have tried to follow up with them but never any response.
- Street use, and no have not had a response to 2 different inquiries.



- as mentioned, the seahawks lighting and music installation on 100th pulled thousands of people into the neighborhood. it is a nightly hassle, and brings strangers into the neighborhood.
- Most people don't stay at the park too long so the cars rotate through, mostly just wait it out.
- Other The "Seahawk House" draws as many as 2500 people on a Friday, Saturday and Sunday night. All of that traffic is funneled into Highlands on one of two roads, and then down NE 100th St. It creates traffic jams, hazardous conditions for pedestrians (those that live here and just want to take the dog for a walk; and those who come to see the "light show".) The city really needs to take a serious look at how this is impacting the neighborhood and streets immediately adjacent to this. I witnessed several near accidents last year, experienced trash in my yard, and got stuck in traffic trying to get to my home (in a quiet residential neighborhood). It might be OK if it was only for 2-3 days, but it starts at Thanksgiving and runs through the New Year every evening of every day until 10 and 11pm each night.
- Parties in the park, bring cars to the street and then they walk down to the park with their beer etc....
- Some neighbors hold social events several times a year that bring 50 to hundreds of cars to the neighborhood. One family has valets to park cars and does not alert the neighbors and valets ignore requests to leave an open parking spot on the street for visitors or resident of my home, Parking on both sides of 111th results in single lane road with no sidewalks VERY dangerous!

- Sometimes take Uber to the event. Sometimes we drive around and around looking for a space to park.




Q21 Additional Comments
