



#### **Q7 Comments**



- 110th Ave NE has permit required parking NE 128th St has parking allowed on both sides of the street
- cars parked on both sides of street day and night due to most households having
   2 or more cars and overflow from full park and ride.
- Currently none of my neighbors park on the street on a regular basis.
- If there are cars parked on both sides of the street, traffic has to slow down (this is a good thing since they go way faster than 25 MPH). If anything we should have speed bumps on the road in front of my house.
- It has 10 times too much traffic on NE 145th ST. The zoning commission has
  failed to curtail overdevelopment, and thus too many apartments are now
  adding traffic to the only cut-through between Kenmore and North Kirkland.
  Further, the overreach of the I-405 3 car carpools has forced even more traffic
  onto Kirkland surface streets, which are woefully underdeveloped for the
  volume of traffic.
- It has become a real problem with people parking on both sides of NE 128th St (I'm in the Tanager condo complex). It is difficult to turn out of the eastern complex entrance because you can't see around parked cars or you have to swing so wide to get around parked cars. This is extremely dangerous as you practically have to go into the oncoming traffic lane.
- our street & surrounding streets are taken over by the employees of Life Care Center of Kirkland, making the street a one-lane road, which is getting dangerous
- The only parking is found on the property of each house, there is no "public parking" on our street.




## Q11: Of the available parking spaces, how full is your street on a typical...








#### Q13 Comments


#### Q14 Comments


#### Q15 Comments



- Can't see oncoming cars due to parked cars too close to intersection/stop sign of 145th street and 109th AVE.
- Cars back up on street due to poor timing on traffic lights and when Juanita High School gets out. Left turns from driveway impossible.
- Cars parked in front of fire hydrant, too close to stop signs
- Fire lanes
- I am concerned that bus riders (or others) who might park on my street could leave items in their cars that would attract car prowls to the neighborhood.
- Lots of cars on in my neighborhood are parked at blind turns, so I'm constantly afraid of head on collision
- people parking in our front yards as there is no sidewalk or parking on the cul-desac
- There have been vehicle prowlers and break-ins in this area. Having so many cars parked on the street is just easy picking for thieves. My car has been broken into twice and stolen once and I park in a carport just off of NE 128th St.
- Two neighbors routinely park vehicles so they block the public sidewalk. One of those vehicles has a boat trailer attached and there's not enough driveway room for the truck & trailer, so it sticks out in the road. Another neighbor is just lazy, and only pulls partway into their driveway.






- I contacted the police by email but they did nothing




- Church attendees aggressively prevent local residents from exiting driveways.

#### **Q21 Additional Comments**




- Downtown Kirkland parking is not easy. I rarely go downtown because of it. I choose to go to Redmond instead.

I realize one side of the street is Bothell but there are usually 5 cars in the street for two houses.
- The parking on blind turns I mentioned previously
- With our street & surrounding streets at one-lane due to Life Care Center of Kirkland, it is dangerous - many near head on collisions, people driving too fast for the one lane situation, and kids walking in the middle of the street, which is the one-lane for cars.
