






#### **Q7 Comments**

  because their employer won't allow them to park in their business parking lot
  which is crazy!!!

- Many cars from Life Care Center of Kirkland park on my street each work day
- My neighborhood is "zoned" as single-family but several of the houses (no condos or apartments) have multiple families or extended family members in occupancy and they all park their vehicles along the curb in addition to filling their individual driveways. One also is a tow truck driver and frequently has towed vehicles attached to the wrecker and taking numerous spaces for the whole vehicle and in tow. Another has a small boat on a trailer parked (stored) along the curb which is never moved.
- Neighbors use the city RW to park trailers and boats, these actions further limit the parking options in my neighborhood
- Parking is allowed on our street, however it's such a narrow street that nobody ever uses it for parking.
- Parking is allowed too close to the condo entrances. It makes it hard to see oncoming traffic to safely pull out.
- The rehab facility parking needs infringe on the neighborhood, all directions, up to three blocks away, to the point where I cannot park in from of my own house.
- We are getting overflow from Juanita Beach Park
- We have severe parking issues due to a nearby retirement and addiction center.
   Our on street parking is unavailable to our use during the day, our driveways are blocked, our garbage cannot be put out w/o the chance of having the cans blocked and red zones are ignored







- Several houses have multiple family or renters in a SF residence and many vehicles are parked most of the time in addition to the driveways being full












- Density keeps increasing

#### Q15 Comments




- 104th is a wide street. Excessive speeding makes it very unsafe regularly. Not good street lighting. Had our tire slashed on our car parked on street last week.
- My car was hit and run in the middle of the night when it was legally parked in front of my home. They caused over 9,000 worth of damage to my vehicle and a police report was filed last year. Others on my street have had similar issues with cars being swiped, dinged and damaged.
- There are a lot of accidents on Juanita Drive, just pass 93rd where Juanita Drive curves to go up the hill. Also, those west bound on Juanita drive turning onto 93rd
- vehicles parked on both sides impede rescue or emergency response vehicles and, occasionally make the garbage pickup vehicles difficult and requires backing up to get a more direct angle for passing between the parked vehicles.







- Use public parking (Heritage, Marina Park, etc)




#### **Q21 Additional Comments**



- Boats, trailers, motor homes parked on city RW creating parking issues, car passing issues and down grading the overall neighborhood appearance
- Downtown: People are too eager/ and are expecting to find a parking spot just in front of the business they are to patronize. It is an expectation that is impossible in a town like Kirkland (with lake, parks, older buildings, etc). Public leaders have to better educate the public and drum up support that visitor actually can, should and will in surrounding neighborhoods. Living close to downtown has great benefits, but the streets will also sometimes need to be used for public overflow parking.
- I have observed that people, especially residential neighborhoods, think that the street in front of their house is for their sole use, they have a sense of ownership. In fact, this is the public space, and NOT for their use to store excess cars or boats or whatever. If residents in multi-family units are expected to never park on a public street, then the single family neighborhood residents should have to live up to that same standard.
- inability to tag & tow vehicles. No parking enforcement unless you are in the downtown area.
- Juanita Community club generates way too many cars for the area. They line both sides of NE 130th place and make it impossible to drive down that road to my home
- Juanita Village traffic increase. Very difficult to find parking at the Village. 600 apartments crammed in the Village and height is inconsistent with surroundings. The City should never have approved the density in an already high traffic area.
- Juanita Village...not enough street parking built to accommodate all the businesses and the residents who often have guests and may have more than one car.
- Just thankful I don't own a business in Kirkland. Parking issues prevents them from being successful.
- Kirkland Marina NO guest parking
- non-vehicles or inoperable vehicles being left for long periods along the street and clutter the area with unsightly and "unneighborly" waste.
- Not enough parking in Juanita Walgreens Beach area.
- paying to park anywhere anytime is not acceptable.
- There is not enough public parking spots in Kirkland. This is a direct result of city planning and not projecting the future need of public parking. With high density building it should be required to build the proper amount of parking spaces per unit. The city's new requirements put in too many assumption of people using transit and allows for too few parkins spaces to be built.
